## NEW ONLINE TOOLBOX PROVIDES GUIDANCE ON LAND USE CHALLENGES





# SMART GROWTH AWARDS HONOR PEOPLE \*\*\*\*\* AND PROJECTS AROUND THE STATE

When Bob Lloyd, this year's recipient of our Arthur Gibb Award for Individual Leadership, wrapped up his acceptance speech at the close of our 2007 Smart Growth Awards, he left attendees with this thought: "All land in Vermont is, in some sense, a common interest commodity. Living in Vermont is a common interest enterprise."

Bob's humble and eloquent words echoed the sentiment of all award recipients – that we can work together to ensure Vermont grows in a way that respects our history, culture and unique landscape.

This prestigious award honors an individual whose leadership has brought about a positive and lasting change in the way their community integrates growth with conservation. Widely considered the father of Act 250 and the prime force behind the state's billboard law, Arthur Gibb was Chair of the Environmental Board and a state senator from Addison County. He passed away in 2005 at the age of 97.

## COMMUNITY SPOTLIGHT CORNWALL

Cornwall, a town of approximately 1,200 year-round residents, is facing the same development pressures as many small Addison County communities. Its proximity to neighboring Middlebury, which is experiencing a period of intense growth, has contributed to a substantial demand for new housing in town.

In recent years, the Cornwall Planning Commission has been busy with reviewing several large residential subdivisions, while at the same time updating its planning policies. A new Town Plan was prepared with the help of the Addison County Regional Planning Commission. After the Plan was adopted in 2005, the Commission turned to the complicated task of overhauling its zoning bylaws and subdivision regulations.

The Commission asked Smart Growth Vermont to help reach out to area landowners, identify appropriate boundaries for the Village District, and help prepare standards to encourage new housing that reflects a village scale and pattern of development. Staff helped conduct a survey of landowners in the vicinity of the Village, worked with the regional planning commission to study boundary options, and helped craft new development standards. In addition, Terra Firma Design developed graphics to illustrate the goals those standards are intended to achieve.

"Smart Growth Vermont helped to focus on different options for the Village and innovative ways to manage future development," explained Planning Commission Chair Bruce Byers. "With the help from both the regional planning commission and Smart Growth Vermont, I'm comfortable that we have developed a sound set of regulations." \*

### LEGISLATIVE INITIATIVES

Smart Growth Vermont is working with our legislative partner, Preservation Trust of Vermont, on a number of key land use issues during the legislative session. As the session progresses, we will issue Legislative Alerts on these and other important initiatives:



#### Increasing the Downtown Tax Credits:

We are advocating for an increase in the amount of tax credits available to owners of buildings in designated downtowns and village centers.

# Evaluating the Use Value Appraisal Program: This important program, commonly called the "Current Use" program, has been reviewed by a legislative task force charged with evaluating program effectiveness, considering modifications

and making recommendations to the Legislature in January. We are working to ensure this program continues to provide benefits to Vermonters who conserve and work the land.

#### Addressing the Affordable Housing Shortage:

Smart Growth Vermont and members of the Vermont Smart Growth Collaborative are working with other stakeholders to develop a program that provides incentives for the construction of new housing that serves the needs of low and moderate income Vermonters; fosters smart growth development that reinforces Vermont's historic settlement pattern; and discourages scattered development and fragmentation of farms and forest lands.
